CMAT topper shares success secrets.

In the very first CMAT conducted this year, Vidyalankar's student Ameya Gharpure, currently pursuing BE in Computer Engineering from VIT has scored a remarkable 99.12 percentile. Read on for the topper's insights on his experiences on preparing for and cracking management entrance exams.

What is your opinion on Management Studies for Engineers?

When I started preparing for the management entrance exam, many of my friends asked me 'why Management after Engineering?' I always had Management in my mind since my XII standard and the reason why I wished to pursue it after Engineering is because I wanted to avail the advantage of sound logical and quantitative abilities that Engineering helps to inculcate. Moreover, it completes the circle of Technology + Management and helps you in becoming a Techno-manager.

When did you start preparing for Management entrance exams?

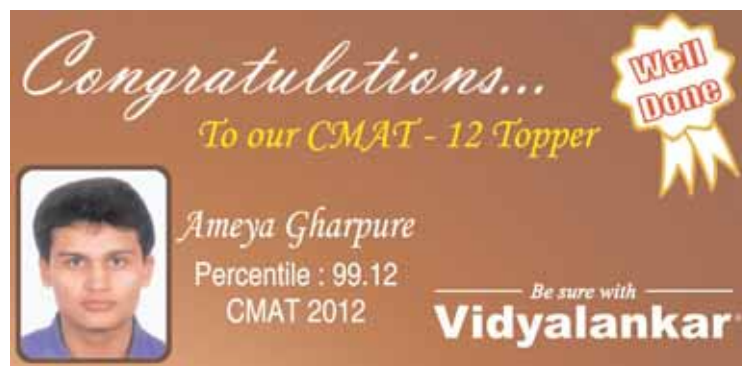
I started preparing for all Management exams in the third year of my Engineering as in the final year there are many other critical factors such as the Final Year project or IEEE papers which you have to submit. Starting preparation in the pre-final year has really proved advantageous for me as it has kept me in good stead. If one starts a year earlier than the others it's but obvious that you are going to have an advantage over the others.

How did you manage the preparation along with regular Engineering studies?

As a part of my preparation in the pre-final year, I joined weekend batches of Vidyalankar Classes for CAT as well as CET preparation. As I used to go for classes on weekends, I could concentrate on college studies during weekdays. Also, I used to devote one to one and half hours daily towards entrance exam preparation and answer whatever tests they used to give me on a regular basis. It is very important for all aspirants to make a specialized time-table according to your routine because without a concrete time-table on paper, it's very difficult to manage time efficiently. Time Management is the most important skill required to clear these management entrance exams i.e. CAT, CET and CMAT.

What is the difference between the three (CAT/CET/CMAT) examinations?

The major difference between the three is that CAT is at the highest level of difficulty of all three, but in CAT you don't have a time crunch, so it



will never happen that you will not be able to complete the whole paper. Though in CET the difficulty level of questions is lesser than CAT but it's almost not possible to solve 200 questions in the given time. CMAT, you could say, lies somewhere between the two as the difficulty level of questions is not as high as in CAT but also not as low as in CET and the time given is more than CET. I personally solved my paper in 2 hrs.15 min. out of 3 hrs. Another difference between CMAT and the other two exams is this that it has a section called GK which has never been there in any of the management entrance exams. What I can say for sure is that preparing for CAT has helped me to solve CET as well as CMAT.

What was your preparation strategy for the three sections of these entrance exams like Verbal, Quantitative and DI?

For Quantitative I took Vidyalankar material and everyday I used to set myself a target e.g. solving 15 or 20 questions in a particular time frame. In order to prepare for Verbal I used to read a lot of newspaper and novels. One interesting thing about Verbal is that many a time students feel that the answer to a question seemed just right, that's why it is right but that is not the case; even English has a science behind it and it is very important to know the reason because of which a particular answer is correct and the others are not. For Data Interpretation I read newspapers especially like Economic Times and magazines like Outlook and India Today. The articles of these newspaper and magazines may have graphs and pie charts associated with the content so inherently when you read such articles and interpret the data from these pie charts it helps you to inculcate those skills needed to solve questions in the exams.

How do you think one should prepare for the newly introduced GK section in CMAT?

For GK I would suggest that rather than scouting through many resources, just stick to one year book and read it thoroughly. Also, we were given a list of events from Vidyalankar. That has given the in-

formation of all the important events of the last two years. Also, CMAT being an Indian exam focuses more on Indian events, so one should regularly follow the news and current affairs.

What are the other benefits of preparing for these management entrance exams?

The main advantage that I found by preparing for any of the management entrance exams is that in the third and fourth years, a lot of companies come to your campus for placements and each of the companies have its screening procedures. The first stage in the screening process would be an Aptitude Test. An aptitude test is very similar to these management entrance exams. So, when you are preparing for Management Entrance Exams, you are automatically getting prepared for placements and you will stand a better chance to get employed as well.

Elaborate on your experience in CMAT-12 which was conducted for the first time.

CMAT is a computer based exam like CAT but it differs from CAT in the sense that in CAT you are not allowed to move to another section before the time gets over; for CMAT there is no such rule, once you get the paper all the sections are open to you, you can move from one section to another according to your convenience, plus its not compulsory to answer all the questions and it also has negative marking. There is one negative mark for each wrong question. One more beautiful thing about CMAT is that you can apply to all AICTE approved colleges all across India.

What role has Vidyalankar played in your success?

I have always been a Vidyalankar student from the First Year of Engineering, so naturally when it came to my mind that I want to prepare for Management entrance exams, Vidyalankar was my first choice. The main advantage of Vidyalankar is that their teachers are excellent and conceptually very strong, so if you have any doubts they are able to solve it, plus they focus a lot on individual attention e.g. if you have any doubts, the teacher will sit with you even af-

ter the lecture and clear your doubts. Since CMAT is a new exam and has been conducted for the first time this year, I had no idea what to study, where to focus on but Vidyalankar has really helped me a lot in this as it has conducted a workshop before the exam and they covered all the four sections and gave information on what all needs to be studied and how it is to be studied. Another plus point is the test series, especially the detailed analysis given after I had given the test. Through this analysis I came to know about my individual marks, where do I stand amongst the Institute's students, who are the toppers, how much they have scored, what sections I have to work on and all this information was given through bar charts and pie charts and also guided me about where I can improve and how I can improve. The tests were very accurate e.g. I scored 244 in Vidyalankar's CMAT test and 248 in the final CMAT. Vidyalankar's tests give you a very good indication of where do you stand with respect to the others in the crowd.

Cool tips while exercising during summer

- Keep drinking water or electrolytes after every 20-25 minutes. This will prevent you from getting dehydrated. The water used should be of room temperature.

A Project On PC Controlled Robotic Vacuum Cleaner

This project has been conceptualized in such a manner that a 3 or 4 wheeled robot, which will be fitted with a vacuum cleaner pump will be made to take rounds of a pre-defined perimeter, such as an airport or an industry area. This can be monitored on the PC by a remote up-keeping staff. When dirt is seen, the robot can be made to take cleaning action.

The team got this idea after watching various programs and news on robotics on the internet and through library medium; the idea of dirt fighting is inspired through recent news about an incident in local area. It hopes that

the project will get sponsored and will be good enough to be implemented in real life.

The following are the advantages:

1. Single (or more) robots can take cover of a very large area, especially areas unsafe for humans (e.g. radiation contaminated)
2. If unwanted matter is found, say dirt or objects, robots can take some cleaning action (it can have a liquid or an air dirt cleaner)
3. If the threat is not resolved then the cleaning team can be sent.
4. It can be fitted with many sensors for area sensing and monitoring (e.g. Gas sensor like

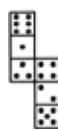
