New Security Thinking for a New World

As an armchair student of the big transitions that happen in the IT industry, I've learned that the hard part is getting your mind wrapped around a relatively new perspective. We, as technologists, tend to focus on how things work, rather than what they might mean.

For example, the internet isn't really about packets and DNS so much; it's about what can happen when connectivity becomes ubiquitous. Tablets and smart phones are really about when consumption becomes ubiquitous as well.

Cloud isn't about sterile NIST definitions, it's what happens when IT organizations realize they're no longer a monopoly and have to com-

pete for the business.

Big data isn't a capacity problem; it's really about learning a new form of creating value from massive amounts of information.

Get the right perspective on a specific transition, the rest becomes mostly a matter of evangelism and execution. Fail to get the right perspective, and you won't make much progress at all.

And so I enjoyed reading the recent findings of the RSA-sponsored Advanced Threat Summit.

Latest challenges

The latest challenge on the security front isn't necessarily an exotic new threat vector: it's the attackers themselves. They're orga-



nized, well-resourced and patient. And there's no silver technology bullet to effectively combat them.

Although I am most definitely not a charter member of the IT Security Inner Ring, I do watch closely how the discussion is evolving

here, and it appears to be moving very fast indeed.

Many historical precepts about how to think about IT security appear to be quickly falling by the wayside. IT security organizations are now re-thinking how they're organized and how they think about their job. And all sorts of newer technologies are getting pulled in alongside more traditional ones.

Discussions help

During periods of rapid transitions, meaningful conversations between key stakeholders are incredibly valuable. Towards that goal, RSA and TechAmerica recently sponsored an invitation-only Advanced Threat Summit with a list of participants and speakers that reads like a 'Who's Who' in the security world.

Take a chill pill!

In addition to psychological changes, like any emotion, anger is accompanied by physiological changes. When you get angry your adrenaline flows, your heart rate increases, and your blood pressure escalates.

- Yelling at others, slamming doors, and breaking crockery doesn't solve any problem and frequently escalates angry situations between people. Yet, sometimes you just need to vent. Find a safe spot. Go buy a punching bag!
- Taking a few deep breaths calms you, makes you feel stronger both mentally and physically.
- When angry, count to ten before you speak; if very angry, one hundred!
- Give yourself a break. It's easier to think when you're calm than when you're agitated. Then come back to the problem, examine it, and solve it.

A new venture: Business Plan Competition

It is the need of hour that more and more educated people should start their own business instead of searching for a job. India has a large number of graduates, post graduates and professionals completing their education every year. The national think-tank has long back realised the importance of these qualified people venturing into own business and in line with the policy, the government is offering various schemes to encourage new entrepreneurs. University syllabi for BMS, MMS and other such professional courses include subjects like Entrepreneurship Development, Project Management, Rural Marketing, Export Markets etc. There are a number of government and non-government organizations giving entrepreneurship training.

The Department of Management Studies at Vidyalankar Institute of Technology, conducts a large number of beyond syllabus programs for overall personality development of MMS students. The Technical Committee of the Department had organized a unique "Business Plan Competition"



on January 25, 2012. The primary objectives behind this initiative were to educate students in the process of creating and evaluating new business ventures; to prepare students for opportunities in entrepreneurship some time during their careers; and to harness the unique resources that VIT and the MMS Department have to offer.

The speciality of the competition was that, even though it was an intra-college event, through special permission from the Managing Trustee, VJTI Final Year B. Tech. students were permitted for the competition with the objective of interaction between technocrats and managers.

All the participants were asked to

prepare a business plan not merely from the academic point of view but to make the plan so meticulously that it should sail through financial institutions offering advance for real life business proposals. The mathematical expectation behind the motive was, if the competition could create awareness amongst 50% of the respondents and in turn if even 10% of them may start seriously thinking about starting a business and 50% of them really do start business, there would be a turnout of at least 3 to 4 entrepreneurs. If such an initiative were to be taken up in every management



and professional institution, then there would be remarkable release from the pressure of unemployment.

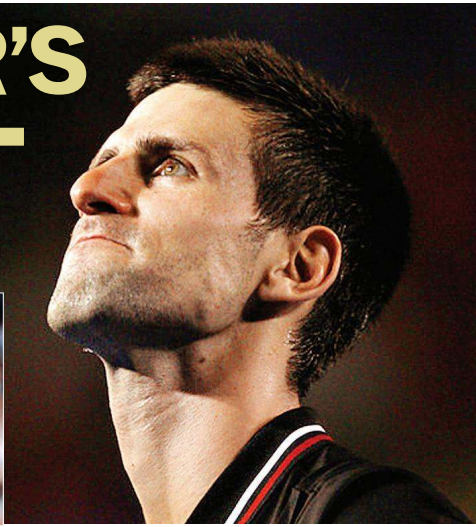
The MMS students of Vidyalankar Institute of Technology and VJTI students showed great enthusiasm for the competition. There were 19 group entries for the business plan competition out of which 6 business plans were short listed for the presentation which took place in VIT on January 25, 2012.

The competition also offered prizes and certificates to the winners and

runners-up of the contest. The event had high profile judges such as K. G. Hebber (an alumnus of IIM-A, owner of a factory at Rabale MIDC). He was so impressed by the enthusiasm shown by students that he even invited some students for summer internship in his factory. The second judge was Amruta Joshi (an alumna of Wel-lingkar's). She also showed her active involvement by guiding the students to reach the realistic plan. The last judge was Prof. Limaye (Dean Admn, VIT) the one responsible for merging the technical minds with managerial skills. Examples include Werken Tex, Floral Essence, Angel's Educare, Aquaculture, Tea Monarch, Orchids Paper, among others. Team Floral Essence from MMS, VIT bagged the top honors.

This initiative provided an integrative learning experience for participating students, encouraged potential entrepreneurs to present a viable business plan and to get to know the business plans of their peers, and helped them learn more through interaction with others.

JOKER'S ACT



He is writing the history of Serbian tennis in golden letters. Whether he's impersonating Andy Roddick or Jessica Simpson or beating Rafael Nadal and Roger Federer in back-to-back matches, Novak Djokovic commands centre stage - and the full undivided attention of the tennis world.

Born in Belgrade, Serbia, on 5th May 1987, Novak started playing tennis at the tender age of four: The first son of Srđjan and Dijana, Novak was first trained by Jelena Genčić. He took to tennis easily; as they say, he was a natural. "I shall never forget the day when a four year old boy came to my tennis camp with a

bag neatly packed, as if for professional training. I asked him who packed it for him, and he replied he did it himself. When asked what he wanted to be when he grew up, without hesitation he said: "number one in the world", the same answer I was given many years ago by Monika Seles when she was a little girl" - said the legend of Yugoslav tennis, Jelena Genčić. The boy was none other than Novak Djokovic or Nole as he is fondly called.

Novak embarked on his stellar career path when he was just 14 in 2001. He started climbing the ladder of greatness from this age itself. In the 2003 season he continued to impress with great results and titles. It



began with his appearance in the final of the Nurnberg ITF tournament. This was the time when he played his first professional tennis match. Following his appearance at the Challenger tournament in Belgrade in early February 2005, he decided to devote his time and ef-

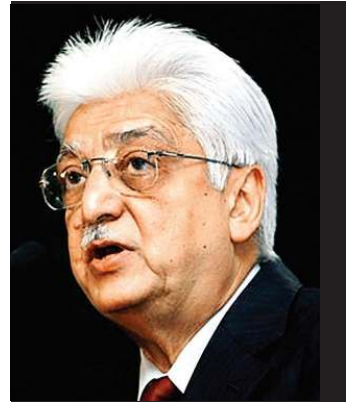
orts to playing professional tournaments and pave the way towards becoming one of the world's best tennis players. That same year he successfully qualified for all the grand slam tournaments and made it to the third round at New York ending the year ranked 80 in the world!

The following year (2006) he won his first ATP tournament in the Dutch city of Amersfort, immediately after which he took another title in Metz. This meant that he became the youngest player inside the top 20. His career really took off in 2007 when he won his first masters tournament at Miami at the "Fifth grand slam". At the US open he made his first grand slam final only losing to Federer. In 2008 Novak took his first Grand Slam tournament - Australian Open! In 2009 he won five major tournaments and made 10 finals. People started taking notice of him and soon his Joker's Act was also experienced by crowds all over the world. The Serb mimics his on field adversaries as a hobby and continuous to entertain crowds all over the world.

2011 belonged to only one man where tennis is concerned. He won 41 out of 43 matches all season - a feat unmatched by any tennis player currently playing. On 4th July 2011 he won the most prestigious Wimbledon championship and fulfilled his childhood dream of becoming Number 1 in the world.

Recently Nole played the longest and perhaps the greatest grand slam final at Melbourne Park against Rafa where both of them were winners but Nole edged to the front to become the champion. Take a bow Novak!

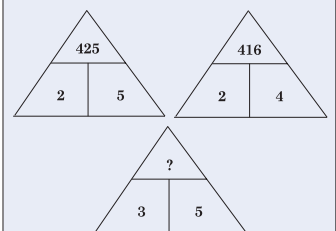

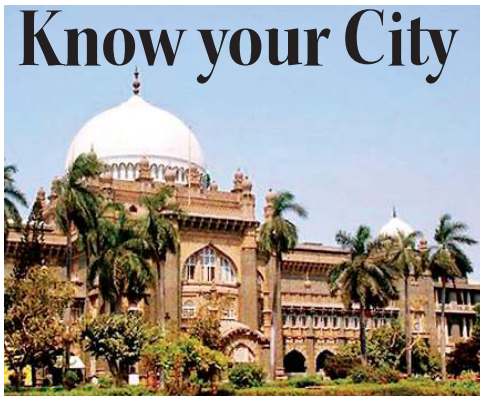

Know your City



Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj Vastu Sangrahalaya (formerly known as The Prince of Wales Museum of Western India) is an important landmark in Mumbai. It was conceptualised by prominent citizens of Bombay, with the help of the government, to commemorate the visit of the then Prince of Wales, and was inaugurated in 1922. It is located in the heart of South Mumbai near the Gateway of India.

George Wittet was commissioned to design the Museum building. Wittet also has the designing of the General Post Office and the Gateway of India to his credit. The museum building is built in the Indo-Saracenic style of architecture, incorporating elements of other styles of architecture like the Mughal, Maratha and Jain.

The museum houses approximately 50,000 exhibits of ancient Indian history as well as objects from foreign lands, categorized primarily into three sections: Art, Archaeology and Natural History. The museum houses Indus Valley Civilization artefacts, and other relics from ancient India from the time of the Guptas, Mauryas, Chalukyas and Rashtrakutas.

The good news is that you can get a quick synopsis of the key findings here and the better news is that interest in the topic is understandably sky-high; so you'll be seeing more events being scheduled before long.

Perception shift

Most IT security pros I meet tend to be under-appreciated, working tirelessly in the background to protect valuable information assets.

For many organizations, coming up with an enhanced approach to IT security is now front-and-center. IT security managers are now being asked to be IT security leaders.

It's not an IT discussion anymore; it's becoming a business discussion.

But, if I'm being honest, my impression is that more than a few IT security professionals will need to step up their game to be effective in this new world.

For starters, I've noticed a nat-

ural tendency to only discuss security matters with a relatively closed group of other security professionals using mostly impenetrable language.

That's not good. People outside of the security world need to understand what's going on here, and why it matters to them.

The sometimes-alarmist tone of external communications has to give way to a clear-headed and sober view that there's a new class of problem out there, and organi-

zations are going to have to invest in a new class of responses.

There will be good days, and not-so-good ones. There will be no perfect solution.

Inevitably, business leaders will need to invest the tools and processes to understand and mitigate the new class of information risks just like they understand and mitigate financial risks, geopolitical risks, legal risks and so on.

And in one sense, the new security discussion really isn't all that new :)
